# **RESEARCH UPDATE**

Three abstracts accepted for presentation this summer

#### **ACSM (Seattle, WA):**

An abstract titled, "A Gender Comparison of Lower Extremity Landing Biomechanics Utilizing Different Tasks" will be presented at this May's annual meeting of the American College of Sports Medicine in Seattle. The purpose of this study was to compare lower extremity mechanics between genders landing from a fixed height and from a self-initiated jump set at a percentage of each subject's maximal vertical jump. Congratulations to authors Erik Swartz, Adam Hernandez, Dain LaRoche and Laura Decoster.

#### NATA (San Antonio, TX):

"Validity and Reliability of the Monitored Rehabilitation Functional Squat Proprioception Test Component" represents continuing work establishing a foundation for the use of the Monitored Rehab device in research. This study sought to assess the measurement accuracy of the MRFSS and determine validity and reliability of the MRFSS proprioception test component. Collaborators on this project include: Eric Gattie, Melissa Heon, Dain LaRoche and Laura Decoster. Eric Gattie was a 2004-2005 NHMI Fellow.

Finally, an abstract in our face mask removal research line will be presented at NATA this summer. "Face Mask Removal in Newly-Designed Football Helmets" was designed to compare the effectiveness of FM removal on newly-designed and traditional football helmets. The Riddell Revolution IQ Quick Release and the Schutt Ion 4D were the "newly-designed football helmets" investigated here. Keith Belmore, Erik Swartz, Laura Decoster and Charles Armstrong collaborated on this project. Keith Belmore was a 2007-2008 NHMI Fellow.

#### **Ongoing Research:**

Data collection is complete in our survey of athletic trainers regarding their experiences with EMTs during on-field emergencies. The study group includes Laura Decoster (NHMI), Jennifer Hootman, PhD, ATC, FACSM (Centers for Disease Control), Erik Swartz, PhD, ATC (University of New Hampshire) and Tom Cappaert, PhD, ATC (Central Michigan University). The nearly 2000 responses will now be analyzed. Stay tuned.
